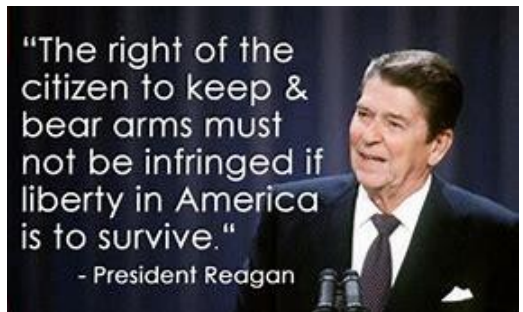

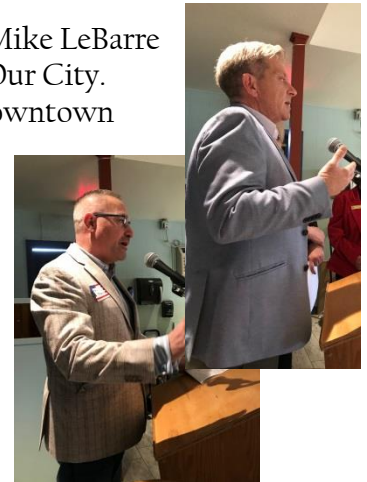

View From The Edge Of The Crowd by Lee Schell

Since I am the featured speaker for February's meeting of the SoMoCo Republican Women, Federated, I thought I would use this space to give members a thumbnail sketch as to what qualifications I bring to the February topic of "A focus On The Second Amendment To The U.S Constitution."

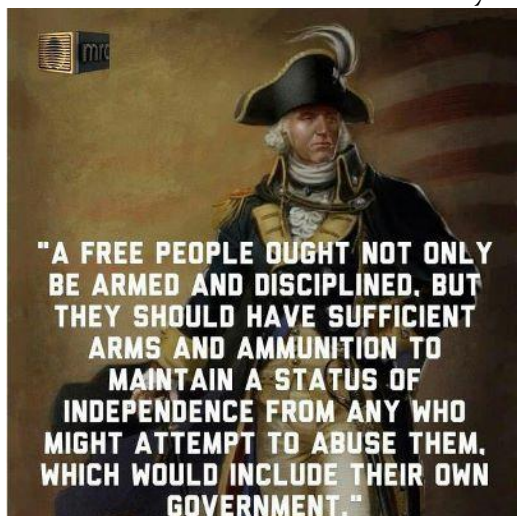


I spent many of my formative years growing up on a farm in Western Minnesota near the border with South Dakota. I was introduced to firearms early on in that agricultural setting. Every tractor, every pickup truck on the farm either had a rifle or a shotgun or both stashed behind a seat with a couple shells. Guns were like shovels to us...tools we used, every day, to get the job done. My dad, a veteran of Patton's Army which rolled across France and was the first U-S force across the Rhine into Nazi Germany, taught me from an early age to respect firearms...how to use them efficiently and avoid a terrible accident. I got my first Red Ryder BB gun when I was 8-years old. I remember my dad told me it was not a toy. He pointed out that what came out of the barrel of that little lever-action air gun could do major harm, so he demanded that I treat it as if it were a real firearm. We've all heard the phrase:... "...you can put somebody's eye out with that thing...". I heard that over and over again. Dad let me go hunting pheasants with him and I carried my BB gun, learning muzzle control and how to safely cross fences with a firearm. All good training for what was to come.



When I was twelve and could legally carry a hunting rifle or shotgun in Minnesota, dad took me to the local Western Auto store and bought me a single shot, 20 gage shotgun made by Savage Arms for the Western Auto chain. It was one of the highlights of my young life and I'll never forget that day. The next weekend I shot my first pheasant in a Minnesota cornfield and I found out that I was a natural marksman.

Fast-forward to 1962, as a newly minted member of the United States Air Force and as a member of my duty station's gun club, I was asked to try out for the Air Force [Europe] Rifle & Pistol team. I made the grade and for 18-months, besides my normal duties, I traveled with the team to compete against other civilian and military marksmen. We were almost always outshot by the Marine Corps and the Army, but I found out that I could shoot with the big boys. Since the Air Force was the first military service to consider replacing the World War-II era 30-caliber carbine and the M-14 battle rifle with the new fangled M-16 rifle [then called the AR-15] I was one of the first to test and evaluate this new firearm. I remember not being impressed with what I thought was a plastic toy, probably made by Mattel in their Ohio plant. Despite my misgivings, Strategic Air Command's General Curtis LeMay adopted the M-16. The other services followed and it has been the most successful battle rifle in firearms history.



If I was a good shot as a young airman, I, at this advanced age with dwindling eyesight, am a better shot than ever, thanks to my lifetime membership with the Front Sight Fire Arms Training Institute outside of Las Vegas, Nevada. About every 14 to 18-months I travel to Front Sight and train, just to keep up my skill-at-arms. I feel that a truly free society is an armed society and history proves that the first step in enslaving a population is taking away their right to keep and bear arms.



OUTREACH

There has been pain, grief, and anger in our community as the result of gang violence. King City had become the shooting mecca of a town our size with unsolved murders. Those are difficult words to write and to read. On a positive note -- within the last two years our community got a breath of fresh air when new people came in to manage our town and police department. A Community Task force focused on ending gang violence was formed and they developed a multi-pronged approach to solving the problem.



There have always been after school activities in King City. However, county and state statistics show a gap in resources for the youngest and most at-risk members of our community. Falling below State school standards indicates a strong potential for failure later which can easily turn into the lure of gang life. Many of our children needed the extra hours an after-school program can provide such as tutoring for better reading skills, play activities, and nutrition.

Our new police chief introduced us to ProYouth, a program that has a 25-year history of success in Tulare County. "The mission of ProYouth is to help youth succeed academically, socially, and emotionally by providing a safe, healthy, and supportive learning environment during out-of-school hours." ProYouth was approached to mentor 2 schools in the King City Union Elementary School District, grades K-4. It's been a great start and next year the goal is to expand the program to a third elementary school with a total of 400+ children.

The Southern Monterey County Republican Women Federated stepped up as one of the first organizations to financially support the ProYouth HEART program in King City. There is hope for positive change on the horizon and SMCRWF wanted to be part of the vision to help make it happen.

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES
TUESDAY, JANUARY 2ND, 2018

Location: Lawrence's Restaurant, King City, CA

CALL TO ORDER: A quorum present, President Karen Leonhard called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. *All Officers Present: President, Karen Leonhard, 1st Vice President, Sue Kleber, 2nd Vice President Jeane Errea-Mills, Treasurer, Dorothy Errea, and Secretary, Kathy Forgnone.*

INVOCATION, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE & THIS DAY IN HISTORY: Led by Secretary, Kathy Forgnone.

INTRODUCTIONS: President Leonhard, recognized speaker King City Mayor, Mike LeBarre, City Councilwoman, Darlene Acosta, former King City Councilwoman, Sue Kleber, Neil Kitchens, of Prunedale, running for Calif. 30th Assembly District, Janet Bessemer, Manager of the King City Chamber of Commerce, Joanne Banuelos, columnist for the King City Rustler Newspaper, and Bonnie Jean Grab's guest, Francesca. *(28 members and guests present.)*

GUEST SPEAKER: 1st Vice President, Sue Kleber introduced guest speaker, Mike LeBarre, King City Mayor. Mayor LeBarre said that efforts are underway to repaint and repair the buildings in the 300 block of King City. He said they are working on plans for a downtown plaza, and a 5-year street improvement plan as well as sidewalk repairs. He commended the efforts of members of King City in Bloom for visually making King City beautiful through planting decorative shrubs and flowers. Mayor LeBarre said the City debt has been reduced 2-1/2 million and the City Council is proud to have been working with a balanced budget.

Additional Speakers: **King City Councilwoman, Darlene Acosta**, gave Mayor Mike LeBarre credit for his work in preventing the sale of Marijuana within the City limits. Councilwoman Acosta said the Victim's Center is coming back to King City. She stated that 40 percent of victim crimes are South County cases.

Candidate for the California Assembly 30th District, Neil Kitchens, a resident of Prunedale in North Monterey County, said California's declaration as a Sanctuary State, doesn't send the right message. Candidate Kitchens said he is hoping the Republican Party can work hard to turn Calif. from a minority into a majority State.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Approval of October Minutes - With no corrections, the Minutes of the November 7th, 2017, General Membership Meeting will stand as approved. **Correspondence** - Gaylon Kastner, Chairwoman for the NFRW Caring for America, sent a thank you note in response to the Club's gift card donations for members who experienced losses from the Napa fire. **Treasurer's Report** - Treasurer, Dorothy Errea, reported the beginning balance on Nov. 28th, 2017, \$5,231.29, Expenses \$966.24, and Income \$1,675.00. The balance as of January 2nd, 2018 is \$5,940.05, noting \$1,000 is pending for the 2016 Scholarship recipient. The report will be filed for audit. (Exhibit A.) **Membership Report.** Chair, Dorothy Errea, presented new member Claudia Wollesen with her American flag pin and welcomed her. The Club has a total of 27 membership renewals, 3 new, and 18 associate renewals, 1 new. **1st Vice-President's Report** - 1st Vice-President, Sue Kleber announced that the speaker for the February 6th, General Membership Meeting, will be Associate Member, Lee Schell, who will speak on Second Amendment Rights.
